College of Education Faculty = **FACULTY**

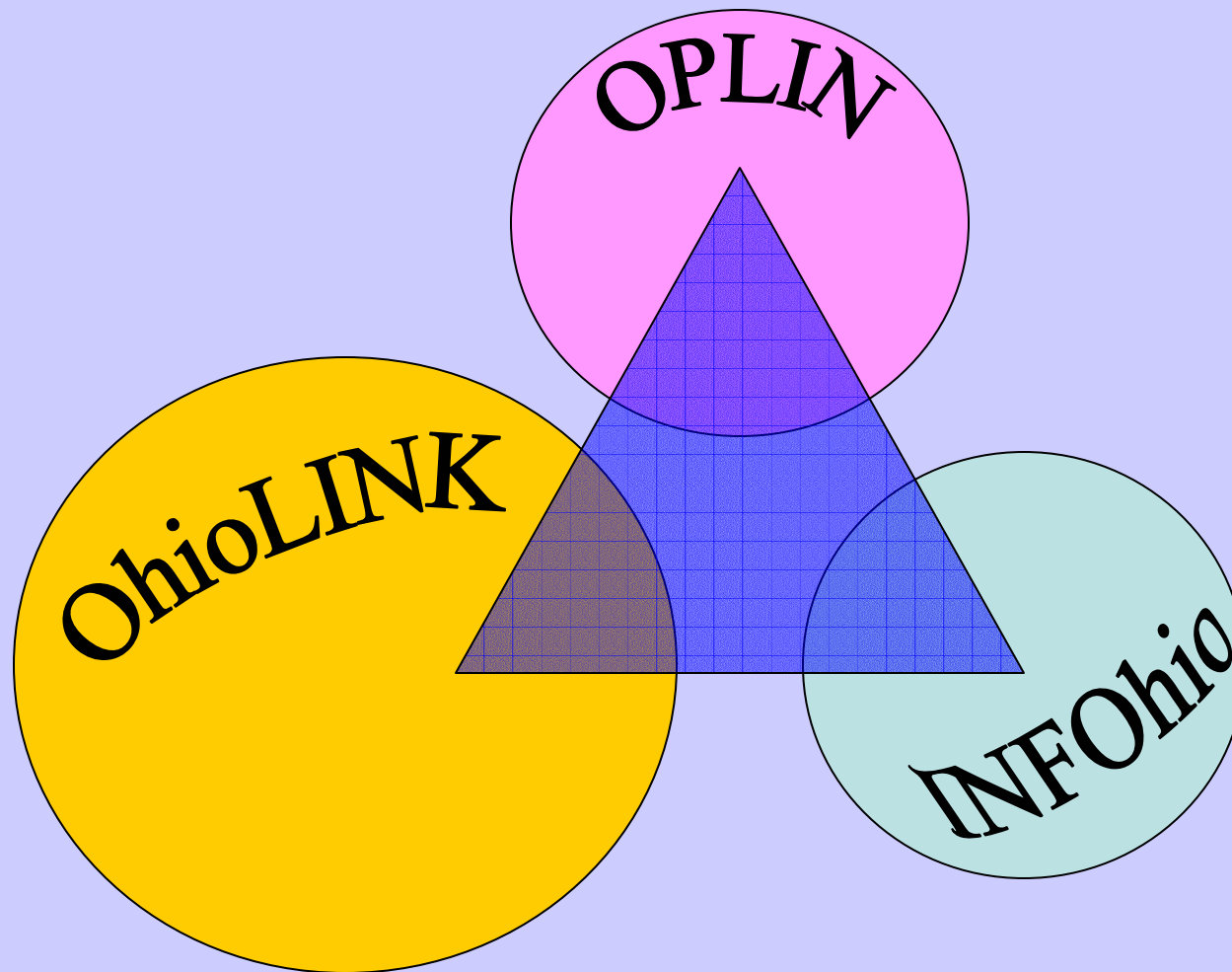
K – 12 Teacher = **TEACHER**
